Letter from the Chief Librarian

I could not be more proud and grateful for all that we have achieved during the past year. During Fiscal Year 2022-2023 we celebrated the 25 years of transformation, growth, and community enrichment in partnership with the Riverside County Office of Economic Development and Library Systems & Services (LS&S).

From 24 branches in 1997, RCLS has grown to 35 branches, two museums, and four Library Connect Resource Vans. Each is a vibrant hub of knowledge, imagination, and opportunity. A substantial **increase in operating hours – now an impressive 69,370 annually** – is clear evidence of our unwavering commitment to meaningful public service. The past 25 years also brought a 118% increase in library visits and a staggering 1610% growth in programs.

The success of the past 25 years is just the beginning. Our partnership with the Riverside County Office of Economic Development continues to lead us in new and exciting directions. The Edward Dean Museum and Gardens is now operated by RCLS and brings new cultural experiences to the County. A new literacy campaign, Read Today, Lead Tomorrow, comprises a variety of programs and workshops that inspire the next generation of readers and leaders.

Library staff are also lifelong learners. Operational partner Library Systems & Services' (LS&S) Leadership Academy provides professional growth training and support to RCLS managers. It is exciting to watch Academy graduates step into their roles as leaders.





Our commitment to community outreach continued to grow with the addition of two new Library Connect Mobile Resource Vans. These mobile libraries bridge educational gaps in underserved regions and embody our dedication to extending educational enrichment to all corners of the County.

My heartfelt appreciation goes to each and every member of the remarkable RCLS team and the Riverside County community for your unwavering support. Our 25-year journey is marked by achievements, growth, and innovation, and I am confident the future holds even more remarkable service. Here's to a future of new achievements, shared milestones, and the enduring impact of our collective work!

Partnerships

First 5 Riverside County

This organization promotes and supports early child development for prenatal through age five children, their families, and the community. First 5 promotes RCLS Library Connect mobile library services and Lunch at the Library, highlighting the mutual mission of promoting early child and family development. First 5 also connects families to their local library through programs like Raising a Reader where participants receive an RCLS library card. First 5 also donates bilingual "Kits for New Parents" and provides additional resources for new and expecting parents.

REFORMA

The Inland Empire chapter of REFORMA helps with recruiting and support of RCLS bilingual and bicultural library staff. REFORMA also helps develop Spanish-language collections and promotes the Library to Spanish speakers. Future plans include expansion of mentorships, programs, and events that showcase the interests and needs of Latinos throughout the County.

Friends of the Idyllwild Library

This dedicated group understands the critical importance of well-funded libraries and helps fund a variety of services for all ages. The Friends help provide programming that would otherwise be unattainable. The Friends of the Idyllwild Library have funded events with guest speakers including Mallory O'Meara, Judalon de Bornay, Brett Perkins, and Marcia Gawecki. They also purchase the books for the Youth Book Club in which each child gets to keep their own book. The Friends provide \$500 monthly for new books, magazine renewals, craft supplies, STEAM Kits, pickleball kits, and much more.

Riverside County Office of Economic Development

RCLS continues to benefit from strong partnership with the Riverside County Board of Supervisors and Riverside County Office of Economic Development. These partnerships bring valuable resources and programming.

A highlight was the Community Faire held at the French Valley Library in November 2022. More than 1,200 residents participated in STEAM activities including VR, 3Doodler Pens, geometric puzzles, sensory blocks, Picasso tiles, clip connects, digital blocks and magnetic tower, rig-ma-jig, and brainflakes. Staff created a self-guided interactive local history tour and a local history artifact display was unveiled.

In February 2023, the Third District office joined Riverside University Health System's Public Health team and the Blue Zones Initiative for a community assessment at the French Valley Library. The goal of the Blue Zone project was to make healthy choices accessible through community improvements such as street and park design, public policy, and social improvement.

April 2023 brought a Job and Resource Fair to the French Valley Library, bringing together 24 companies and government agencies seeking employees, seven non-profit organizations offering employment or veteran services, and over 300 community members. Programs like these are possible only through this valuable partnership.

Inland Counties Legal Services

Lawyers in the Library, a program that offers free legal services in consumer, family law, housing, immigration, public benefits, and more, is available at five branches. This initiative connects individuals with qualified pro bono lawyers, ensuring equal access to legal assistance. Patrons can easily register for a one-hour consultation by walking in or calling for an appointment, providing the community with easy access to valuable legal guidance.

Services and Innovation

Library Card Kiosks

Patrons can quickly and easily register for a library e-Card and instantly receive their card number at these convenient stations. eCards are valid for up to three months and can be converted to a full -use card.

The RCLS app


Available via the App Store, the RCLS app provides self-checkout, a list of all digital resources, a list of new items in the libraries, and a digital copy library card. Patrons may also select their preferred language.

Library Connect Vans

Two new vans were added to Literacy Services to better serve the north and south areas of Riverside County. The vans bring crafts, library books, and hotspots for checkout to every corner of the County, particularly underserved rural areas.

California State Parks Library Passes

Park Passes available for checkout provide free vehicle day-use access to over 200 parks, lakes, beaches, and monuments in the California State Parks system.





Diversity and Inclusion

The Home Gardens Photographic Discovery Project took place in the Fall of 2022 in partnership with UCR ARTS and Inlandia Institute Publications. Teens took inspiration from local award-winning author Isabel Quintero's graphic biography of a celebrated Mexican photographer, *Photographic: The Life of Graciela Iturbide*. By exploring their neighborhoods through photography, teens engaged with their communities and published *Home Gardens: Photographic Discovery*.

The Ronald H. Roberts Temecula Public Library continued to offer Inclusive Storytimes. These events provide hands-on activities and opportunities and bring children of all abilities together. Children are encouraged to learn through play and organic social interactions occur between children with and without special needs. Congressman Darrell Issa's Deputy District Director, Michael Hileman, visited the Ronald H. Roberts Temecula Public Library during Storytime and nominated the Library for the 2023 National Medal for Museum and Library Service.

Community

RCLS hosted the French Valley Community Faire. The event featured the unveiling of the French Valley Historical Society's new local history exhibits. Celebrations included the French Valley Library's first birthday and the 25th Anniversary of RCLS. Community and County Resources – including the Fire Truck from Station 83 – storytimes, live characters and entertainment, kids zone activities and crafts, lunch provided by the In-N-Out Food Truck, and more entertained the community. The Faire also featured walk-through history tours and docent talks about the development of the French Valley Community from the early 1870s to today.

Lunch At The Library

Many students rely on school lunches. When they are not available during the summer, Lunch at the Library (LATL) provides grants, training, resources, and technical assistance to help libraries establish successful summer meal sites or provide learning programs at other community meal sites. Libraries may participate in LATL as library meal sites, pop-up libraries to community meal sites, or a combination of the two. Participating libraries may also incorporate Youth Development programs into their Lunch at the Library programs to create opportunities for teens to support summer meals in either or both settings.


