



Programming Highlights

Kids Fest & Community Resource Fair

The Moorpark City Library hosted its inaugural Kids Fest Celebration and Resource Fair on April 29 to commemorate Día de los Niños. A cornerstone of Kids Fest was the Resource Fair, where caregivers were connected with a plethora of resources available in the community. Local organizations, educational institutions, and service providers came together to showcase their offerings, ranging from early childhood education programs to parenting support services. This interactive fair facilitated meaningful connections between caregivers and the resources they need to support their children's growth and development.

Kids Fest celebrated cultural diversity through enriching activities, from multicultural storytelling sessions to arts and crafts workshops inspired by global traditions. By exposing children to different cultures and perspectives, Kids Fest fostered a sense of inclusivity and appreciation for diversity within Moorpark.

The activities offered at Kids Fest were thoughtfully designed to support early childhood development. Children enhanced their cognitive, social, and emotional skills through hands-on learning experiences, creative expression, and interactive play. Caregivers were provided valuable insights and resources to facilitate their children's holistic development during these formative years.

Summer Reading Program

In 2023, the Summer Reading Program was simplified for a more straightforward challenge where participants were urged to read daily for four weeks. This streamlined approach resulted in a remarkable increase in engagement and completion rates soared from 10% to an impressive 50%. The program tapped into a wider audience by removing complexities, emphasizing consistency, and encouraging sustained participation. The simplified format proved highly effective in promoting literacy and generating a love for reading within the community.



In addition to simplifying the Summer Reading Program, the Library made another significant event change by moving Touch a Truck from September to the kickoff event in June. This alteration proved immensely successful: the event's highest attendance included 600 participants. Kickoff attendees also enjoyed the Mayor announcing the Summer Reading Bookmark Contest winners. Additionally, First5 provided sensory activities for families, adding a dynamic element to the event and fostering inclusivity.







Solar Eclipse Celebration

The Solar Eclipse Viewing Party on Saturday, October 14 brought together 100 enthusiastic attendees of all ages, backgrounds, and levels of astronomical knowledge to witness a rare celestial spectacle. The event featured an array of telescopes and solar filters available for use, allowing attendees to get up close and personal with the eclipse and experience breathtaking views of the sun's gradual transformation. The awe and excitement on participants' faces as they peered through the telescopes, some for the first time, added to the already amazing experience. Pam Hoffman, founder of Everyday Spacer and member of the Ventura County Astronomical Society, was ready and willing to answer questions, explain the science behind the eclipse, and offer guidance on safe viewing. Pam's interactions enriched our understanding of the eclipse and provided an opportunity for attendees to connect with fellow astronomy enthusiasts, share experiences, and make new friends. The Library distributed 500 free eclipse-viewing glasses to Moorpark residents leading up to the event.















Tiny Art Show & Reception

The 3rd Annual Tiny Art Show saw significant growth this year. Registered participants increased by 163%, totaling 245 contributors. Out of the registered participants, 117 pieces of artwork were displayed, showcasing the dedication and artistry of the individuals involved.

The Tiny Reception on November 1 had 111 individuals, marking the pinnacle of the event. Refreshments including sparkling cider and assorted snacks added to the charm and overall experience for attendees

Local Author Showcase & Book Sale

The Local Author Showcase provided a platform for the literary achievements of 27 writers residing in Ventura County, forging a deeper connection between authors and readers while highlighting the rich tapestry of voices within Moorpark. The Showcase featured a diverse array of genres spanning from fiction to poetry and memoirs to children's literature, reflecting the multifaceted interests and talents of our local authors. Attendees had the opportunity to engage with writers and participated in meaningful dialogue and connections that transcended the boundaries of the written word.



The Local Author Showcase not only celebrated the literary accomplishments of our community, but also served as a catalyst for collaboration and creativity. By nurturing a supportive ecosystem for local writers at the Showcase, the Library cultivated a vibrant literary culture based on inclusivity, innovation, and the shared love of storytelling.







Triple P Workshops

In the fall of 2023, the Library partnered with Interface Children & Family Services to offer a series of workshops to caregivers in the community called Positive Parenting Program, better known as Triple P.

Triple P provided evidence-based strategies and techniques to promote positive parent-child relationships, manage challenging behaviors, and foster healthy child development. These workshops provided caregivers invaluable insights, practical strategies, and a supportive community to share experiences and learn from one another. The positive feedback and participation we received underscored the importance and relevance of such initiatives within our community.

Aventuras en Lecturas/Bitty Bilinguals

Recognizing the diverse linguistic needs of our community, we transformed our bilingual storytime, previously facilitated by First5, into Aventuras en Lecturas, a unique Spanish Storytime program led by our dedicated library staff. This transition highlights our commitment to adapting and expanding our services independently, ensuring we continue to meet the diverse needs of our community.



Aventuras en Lecturas was a collaborative effort developed by our proficient Spanish-speaking staff and our dedicated children's librarian. The program's launch was met with enthusiasm from the community, with families expressing gratitude for the opportunity to engage with Spanish literature and culture. This initiative facilitates interactions between library staff and Spanish-speaking families and increased awareness of our Library's resources and services.

LEGO Robotics Club

In 2023, the Library continued its proud tradition of fostering innovative learning experiences through the LEGO Robotics Club. This club serves as a catalyst for collaboration, creativity, and technological exploration within our community. One of the most remarkable aspects of the LEGO Robotics Club is its student-led nature, a testament to the passion and ingenuity of our young leader, Gohith Chittajallu.

Under Gohith's guidance, participants are led to design, build, and program robots using LEGO Mindstorms kits. As they delve into engineering and programming, students are not merely passive recipients of knowledge; they become active creators and innovators.








Art for All

In 2023, the Library continued to generate inclusivity and creativity through its Art for All program. This initiative, aimed at children in grades 3-8 with physical and/or developmental disabilities, is facilitated by enthusiastic and empathetic volunteers from the Teen Advisory Group. These young leaders bring their artistic talents and serve as mentors and role models for the participating children. By promoting inclusivity and celebrating diversity through art, the program enriches the lives of its participants, challenges societal perceptions, and fosters a more compassionate and inclusive society.

Library Collections



Ensuring Equity

Incurring fines can be a significant burden, especially for low-income families, fixed-income seniors, and individuals facing financial challenges. These fines often act as barriers that prevent people from accessing critical information and resources available at the Library. To enhance accessibility and inclusivity, the Moorpark City Library has implemented a fine-free policy and has waived all outstanding late fines. This initiative relieves patrons burdened by fines and will encourage more people to use the Library's resources, borrow materials, and participate in programs and services. By removing the financial obstacles associated with fines, the Library hopes to increase utilization and be more accessible to everyone in the community via its resources, materials, and programs and services.



Library of Things

The Library of Things continues to thrive in its ongoing commitment to provide diverse and enriching resources to the community. This innovative program offers patrons access to many items beyond traditional books, fostering learning, creativity, and exploration.

PARENTING PACKS:

With 90 circulations over the past year, the Parenting Packs have proven to be invaluable resources for families in our community looking for assistance in their parenting journey. These kits are carefully curated to support parents in various stages, offering guidance, tools, and activities to enhance parenting skills and promote child development.

MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS:

The collection of musical instruments has been a hit, circulating 95 times in the past year! From guitars to keyboards, these instruments have helped patrons explore their musical talents, sparked new creative endeavors, and brought the joy of making music to Moorpark.

PARKS PASSES:

Nature offers boundless opportunities for exploration and rejuvenation. The Parks Passes were circulated an impressive 178 times over the past year. These passes provide access to state parks, allowing patrons to connect with the outdoors, enjoy recreational activities, and appreciate the beauty of nature.

Grants & Special Projects

Solar Science Kit

The Library received a Solar Science Kit from NASA@My Library to support the October 2023 eclipse and other astronomy/solar activities. The project was funded by the Space Science Institute's STAR Net team thanks to a grant from the Gordon and Betty Moore Foundation and a supplement to the NASA@My Library Project.

The Library was awarded \$2,648 in California Library Services Act funds for the ZipBooks grant project in FY 2022-2023 and \$3,645 for FY 2023-2024. 
